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What's Happening with Our Members?

The California Senior Volunteer Program has been in place for over ten years and is managed out of the local CHP offices around the state. It is comprised entirely of retired, volunteer community members under the direction of sworn CHP law enforcement officers. Once candidates

graduate from a two week academy, we take the Oath and are sworn



into the CHP to provide assistance at the front desk, meet and assist the public, provide patrols in CHP cruisers around local schools and community events in order to get folks to slow down...and get off their cell phones!

We can also take the cars out on canyon patrol designed to basically show the CHP colors around our local canyons such as Topanga, Malibu and Kanan Road. We also provide backup for motorists who may be stranded due to mechanical problems since cell phone reception and emergency call boxes are a bit sparse through the canyon areas. We also present programs to elderly drivers and speak at high schools

on issues of personal responsibility behind the wheel.

The Academy sessions were held every day from 0800 to 1600 hours and provided an eye-opening look at the CHP's heritage, technology and tactics during our two weeks. The sessions were held at the Los Angeles County Communications Center in Eagle Rock just East of Glendale...one fascinating aspect was our time spent listening into the 911 calls coming in from motorists with a variety of problems, concerns and questions.

One policy I learned about during the CHP SVP Academy was that if

CHP encounters a female alone or with children at night along the side of the road with a mechanical issue, the officers will typically stay with the motorist until the requested assistance arrives...we also learned the term 'traffic accident' is not used but 'traffic collision'.

I will be 'flying' out of the West Valley CHP office on De

Bob Spencer honored with the Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award and the PHPA Leadership Award

Our own Robert W. Spencer received the FAA's prestigious Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award on May 20, 2017, at the PHPA / FAASTeam Safety Seminar held at Chino Airport. Bob was the featured speaker and instructed attendees on Helicopter flying: What can go wrong. This is a course of instruction in which he is an acknowledged expert specializing in advanced emergency procedures, touchdown autorotations, mountain flying, and vertical reference training.

A graduate of the United States Naval Academy and U.S. Navy Veteran, Bob has served aviation for more than 50 years, with over 35 years as a distinguished



helicopter instructor pilot with Western Helicopters, now located at Riverside Municipal Airport. He has been a member and supporter of the PHPA since the early days of our association and has given many hours of his time to our members as a safety seminar speaker in the furtherance of education and safety.

Mr. Spencer was also awarded The PHPA Leadership Award. It is designed to honor pilots who have excelled as professional pilots and have continually demonstrated leadership within the helicopter industry. Bob has met this criteria for many years and we see no end in sight. He has been a mentor and friend to a great many helicopter pilots, and PHPA is honored to be able to acknowledge his contribution to our industry and to our association.

Pete Gillies honored with the Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award

A pilot for more than 50 years, and recently retired as a long-time helicopter instructor pilot with Western Helicopters, Mr. Gillies is also our 2016 Lifetime Achievement Award winner. He has been a friend and member of the PHPA for decades, volunteering many hours to our members as a safety seminar instructor in the furtherance of education and safety.

International. PHPA is an affiliate of HAI and HAI's Board of Directors were in town for a meeting with their Board Chairman, TC Corell, Chief Pilot of Southern California Edison Aviation. They generously agreed to sponsor the event with dinner and refreshment and it was a great night at the 94th Aero Squadron in Van Nuys.

PHPA President Morrie Zager opened the evening with the introductions of our 2017 Board of Directors, the HAI Board of Directors and HAI President and CEO Matt Zucarro. He then introduced Mrs. Kathryn Purwin, CEO of Helinet, and her daughter Michaela, our esteemed guests, who represented Alan Purwin, the evening's honoree. Morrie's final introduction to the gathered members was Mr. Dennis Roberts, FAA Western-Pacific Regional Administrator and the evening's opening speaker.

Mr. Roberts, recently appointed FAA Western-Pacific Regional Administrator, spoke of his distinguished career, which included working on behalf of the FAA with many community groups throughout the country with concerns about the impact of aviation on their communities. Noise was, and is, one of the hottest topics nationally and he commended PHPA's efforts while working with the FAA

on the L.A. County Helicopter Noise Initiative, as well as our Board's continuing engagement with the Los Angeles Area Helicopter Noise Coalition in a meaningful manner. He suggested that this issue was not going away anytime soon and we as an industry should continue our good work with the FAA, partner associations and Community Groups. It is important for the helicopter industry to work to mitigate the issues and come to mutually agreed and beneficial solutions.

Pres. Zager then gave the PHPA State of the Association address to the membership.

"Much has happened since our meeting last year, which, by the way, fell on my birthday. This year, our event just happens to fall on Steve Goldsworthy's wedding anniversary. I guess it's not such a good sign that Steve is here solo tonight!"

"PHPA continues to be at the forefront in the local battle here in the Los Angeles area fighting for the rights of helicopter pilots and operators. Our profession continues

to be under attack from the homeowner's groups who would like nothing more than to rid helicopters from the airspace."

"Although we have been successful thus far in avoiding the implementation of four SFAR's sought by those homeowners' groups, this battle is far from over. The homeowners have not given up and they continue their appeal to the FAA and elected officials to

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Alan D. Purwin **PHPA Lifetime Achievement Award**

The Professional Helicopter Pilots Association is honored to award the 2017 PHPA Lifetime Achievement Award to Alan D. Purwin. This award was given in commemoration of his life, career, and humanitarian achievements, as well as his contributions to the helicopter industry. The Award was presented posthumously to Mrs. Kathryn Purwin, Alan's wife, during this year's Annual Membership Meeting on April 25, 2017.

Here's Alan's story: For 38 years, Alan was an invaluable part of the aviation community. He started his career at the early age of 17 as a crop duster in Indiana, flying ten to twelve hour

days serving the local farming

industry.

Shortly after, Alan began working for a California company where he provided aerial footage for the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. Soon after that, he entered the film and television industry, flying stunts for such shows as Airwolf and The A-Team.

Alan continued to build his career as a film pilot, while simultaneously building an aviation empire. He saw that most aviation companies used outdated equipment and based their business on a small selection of rotorcraft. In response to this increasing need, Alan co-founded West Coast Helicopters in 1987.

Before long, West Coast was providing charter flight services, performing aerial stunts for television and film, and had secured a news contract with KTLA in Los Angeles. In 1992 and 1993 respectively. West Coast Helicopters was retained for vital organ transport programs for Cedars-Sinai and UCLA Medical Center.



By 1994, the business was thriving. Alan later merged West Coast Helicopters with Helinet Aviation, which he purchased in 1998. 1n 1999, Alan met with the head of the emergency transport program at Children's Hospital Los Angeles. During that time, the hospital did not own a helicopter; rather they contracted out to a company that did not make the hospital its priority. Children's Hospital could not afford to purchase a helicopter, pay for a pilot or fuel.

Alan saw how the hospital desperately needed a better solution to help save children's lives, leading him to donate a brand new Sikorsky helicopter to the hospital, fully equipped for medical purposes. Alan also provided CHLA with an additional helicopter and full flight support, all for free. Helinet became the exclusive helicopter provider for Children's Hospital Los Angeles. Alan also contributed to the hospital by providing leadership and guidance as a member of the board of directors.

Alan's groundbreaking efforts

extended to his work in movies, his ability to safely create movie chaos valued like no other in the motion picture industry. He was the most sought-after helicopter stunt pilot and aerial coordinator in the world, having turned his skill and passion for flying into a multi-million dollar, multi-faceted business. Alan was always willing to push the envelope, but everything was always planned down to the smallest detail. It was all about accomplishing the director's vision with viable solutions and maximum safety.

Alan tragically passed away in 2015. After his death, the emergency transport program for Children's Hospital was renamed in Alan's honor as The Alan Purwin Emergency Transport Program. He is responsible for saving thousands of lives and continues to do so even after his passing. Alan was known for his passion, generosity and remarkable entrepreneurial leadership. His life work continues to inspire the aviation community to push the boundaries and innovate.

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implement those regulations. Our partners in the New York area have not been as lucky! Tour companies now only provide half the number of tours as before and do not operate on Sunday at all. Despite the tremendous decline in tax revenue, the local politicians there caved into the homeowners' groups and disregarded the rights of the helicopter operators to lawfully conduct their business."

"Thanks to all the hard work by the PHPA, and Chuck Street's organization, The Los Angeles Helicopter Operator's Association (LAHOA), the education and outreach programs our organizations have provided to our local helicopter pilots and operators and their adherence for the most part to the Best Practices we have agreed on, the complaints to the FAA's Automated Complaint System are now half compared to when the system first came on-line. We have received positive feedback from the Hollywood Bowl that our efforts to avoid over-flying the bowl during concert season were a raving success last season."

"The PHPA has partnered with the FAA in encouraging helicopter pilots to utilize the voluntary off-shore helicopter route. This route has been published in the most recent helicopter route chart. Our counterparts in New York have not been as lucky. They must now follow a compulsory off-shore route. Our hope is that continued education and adherence to this voluntary route will avoid a potentially more restrictive compulsory route."

"We also support the FAA in the 1205/1206 VFR helicopter squawk codes. It should be noted that on April 10th, 2017, the FAA extended these voluntary codes through April 10, 2019. Our spring newsletter was published before this extension became public, so please take note of the new expiration date."

"The PHPA believes strongly in giving back to the helicopter community. We continued our charitable giving endeavors fostering community education by sponsoring events such as the American Heroes Air Show and groups like the Aviation Explorers. What better way to showcase the hard work helicopter pilots do than to bring that education directly to our youth. After all, they are the helicopter pilots of the future! HAI was gracious enough to produce a video showcasing the positive work helicopters do for our community. I am hopeful that video will soon be completed."

"The PHPA is honored to be an affiliate organization of HAI. With the continued support from HAI, I am confident we can continue to move forward to promote our industry. Safety has and always will be our number one concern. Our organization has a long history of promoting the safe operation of helicopters."

"Once again, I am humbled and honored to be the President of this organization and proud of our affiliation with HAI. Thank you again, Matt, for your ongoing support and for sponsoring tonight's event."

Next on the evening's agenda was the presentation of the 2017 PHPA Lifetime Achievement Award posthumously to Alan Purwin. Alan was chosen for his long and distinguished career, his innovations, his humanitarian work and innumerable contributions to the helicopter industry. A true leader in every sense, he built a thriving helicopter charter, EMS, news-gathering, and aerial cinematography company. Mr. J.T. Alpaugh, Alan's long-time friend and colleague, accepted the award on behalf of Kathryn Purwin and her daughter Michaela. Addressing the audience, he spoke of Alan's long association with the PHPA, and offered some anecdotes in memory of his friend. It was obvious that Mr. Purwin touched many people in our industry and is truly missed.

The meeting's guests were then served an excellent full course meal and refreshments, and settled in for dinner with friends and colleagues. Toward the end of the meal, our sponsor and featured speaker, Mr. Matt Zucarro, began the HAI Townhall Meeting.

Matt began by explaining the dual purpose of HAI Townhall Meetings. They are designed to inform members of important issues in the helicopter industry, as well HAI's initiatives in response to these issues. They are in-turn designed to provide HAI feedback from the industry about new and on-going issues that impact helicopter operators; A two-way street of information. He then introduced T.C. Corell, Chairman of the HAI Board of Directors, who then introduced their Board of Directors to the attendees. Mr. Corell explained HAI's commitment to continue the HAI / PHPA partnership in dealing with noise issues in southern California as well as others threatening the helicopter industry nationally. He complimented our efforts saying "PHPA has done a great job."

Mr. Zucarro outlined some current HAI initiatives include "Land the Damn Helicopter," Helicopter Noise, integrating Unmanned Aircraft Systems into the National Airspace System, Municipalities regulating UAS and the FAA's failure to challenge it, UAS lobbying Congress, ATC Privatization and STEM programs. To further HAI's safety and education programs the association recently finished the construction of a new headquarters in Alexandria, VA, that is designed to further the educational and operational needs of members and affiliate associations. Along with HAI business offices the new building has conference rooms and class rooms that are available to affiliate members, at no cost.

In his closing remarks Matt reiterated the huge threat that Helicopter Noise has become. It alone threatens our entire industry and he asked for our help, emphatically stating "We can't do it alone, politicians will do anything to stop the phone calls about helicopter noise" and HAI will be more involved with PHPA and the industry here in SoCal.

It was a great evening of education, comradery and dedication to our great industry. Don't miss the next one, or our upcoming events. We already have HAI/PHPA events in the works for 2018, which will include more Safety Seminars and Townhall Meeting. We'll see you there!

To increase situational awareness of Air Traffic Control, the FAA has reserved discrete codes for VFR helicopters operating within the defined airspace around Los Angeles (LA) California.

General Aviation VFR Rotorcraft are asked to Squawk Mode 3 code 1205 and First Responder/Law Enforcement/Military/Public Service VFR Rotorcraft are asked to Squawk Mode 3 Code 1206 when operating VFR at and below 6000 feet MSL while in the lateral confines of:

Starting at approximately the Northwestern tip of Santa Catalina Island, on a line to California Route 27, following California Route 27, to California Route 118, to US Interstate-210, to California Route 210, to US Interstate-10, to California Route 79, to California Route 74, to US Interstate-5, to California Route 1, to San Juan Creek then, to the Southeastern point of Santa Catalina Island, along all Western coast of Santa Catalina Island, to the Northwestern tip of Santa Catalina Island.

All airmen, fixed wing and rotorcraft are reminded to use the Mode 3 Code 1201, when operating in the lateral confines of the LA Special Flight Rules Corridor.

These unique Mode 3 codes, should only be utilized when operating VFR in the defined area. Mode 3 Codes that are prearranged with the FAA should be used in lieu of utilizing these codes. Requests for VFR advisories should be made to the appropriate air traffic facility and the Mode 3 Code assigned by ATC squawked.

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helicopter route on June 22, 2016. The route encourages helicopter pilots to fly 750' off-shore at an altitude at pilot's discretion. Our organization supports this voluntary route as an endeavor to avoid a compulsory route similar to that imposed on our partners flying in New York. The route can be viewed on the latest Helicopter Route Chart (June, 2016) or by clicking on the following link: http://aeronav.faa. gov/content/aeronav/heli files/Los Angeles Heli 11.zip.

It has been brought to our attention that many helicopter pilots are still not aware of the 1205/1206 helicopter beacon codes within the Los Angeles

region. In short, GA VFR rotorcraft are asked to squawk code 1205. First responders/law enforcement are asked to squawk 1206. All airmen, fixed and rotor-wing, are to use 1201 when operating in the lateral confines of the LA Special Flight Rules Corridor. The expiration date of the 1205/1206 helicopter beacon code request is Why Join the PHPA 04/10/2019. The PHPA encourages

Airmen by checking FAA.gov. It's LTA-OSGW-22 (issued on April 11, 2017).
