Recently an airborne law enforcement unit best known for its vision of the future took an afternoon to look back and celebrate its past.

they paused briefly to look back at their many accomplishments.

Touted as the 75th Jubilee Anniversary, the afternoon luncheon at the Aero Bureau facility in Long Beach featured a full crew of dignitaries, local politicians along with aviation and law enforcement officials. Units representing airborne law enforcement units came from as far away as Santa Barbara County to listen as Aero Bureau's commander and ALEA member, Captain James Di Giovanna welcomed everyone and introduced the afternoon speakers.

Los Angeles County Sheriff Lee Baca took the podium to commend Aero Bureau's history as well as to introduce Sergei Sikorsky, the eldest of Igor Sikorsky's children. Sheriff Baca lauded Igor Sikorsky, as "... the visionary engineer and aviator that made the helicopter successful..."

Sergei Sikorsky fondly related the early days of aviation, recalled a number of interesting anecdotes and explained his father didn't get it right the first time but kept at the single main rotor - single tail rotor design that many 'experts' felt would never get off the ground. "Back in those days of early aviation," Sergei related, "my Dad explained that engineers were also the test pilots and that had the unintended effect eliminating poor engineers very quickly" Sergei explained that much of the success was sheer determination from his father but also his father had also confided in him that, "... we built the helicopter because we were so ignorant we simply didn't know we couldn't do it..."

Sergei also pointedly highlighted the mechanics today and then as the real backbone of aviation units and concluded by " ... extending my thanks to all of you for making my Dad's dream of saving lives come true ..."

Fast forward 75 years and Sikorsky's dream of saving lives with helicopters has become a routine reality for LASD's Aero Bureau. With its current complement of 15 helicopters (3 MD500D & E's, 6 MD520N's, 3 MD 600N's and 3 Sikorsky H-3's) along with two Cessna 210's and a recently acquired King Air B200, Aero Bureau provides patrol support, tactical transport for SWAT, prisoner and VIP transport as well as perhaps their best known role in Search & Rescue operations with their AIR RESCUE 5 Program.

The unit has an especially long relationship with Sikorsky products in their Search & Rescue mission since 1972 when Aero Bureau acquired Sikorsky CH-34's for mountain rescue. In 1983 Aero Bureau upgraded their SAR platforms with Sikorsky S-58T's

and made the move to their current Sikorsky H-3 "Sea Kings" last year. Used by civilian and military units around the world, the Sikorsky H-3 is touted by many as the " ... DC-3 of helicopters ... " referring to its rugged reliability.

The anniversary celebration was also an opportunity for Aero Bureau to put into service the last of three Sea Kings to support their AIR 5 program. The first two aircraft featured N- numbers N950SB and N950DF to honor Sheriff Sherman Block and Senator Dianne Feinstein

The latest member of the Sea King fleet, N240HJ, carries this tradition forward and honors retired LASD Sergeant Harry Jones, - a man also known for rugged reliability during his long tenure as Crew Chief on the AIR RESCUE 5 program. In addition to a framed and signed picture of the Sikorsky H-3 in Aero Bureau colors, Jones received a enthusiastic standing ovation from the audience for his years of service to the AIR 5 program and the community.

In between speeches and hosting duties Captain Jim Di Giovanna took time to reflect back on the progress made at Aero Bureau. "I've been very fortunate to be assigned to the Bureau during some historical periods

of growth and acquisition of new equipment and aircraft, " Di Giovanna admitted. He added that plans are now underway to expand the Aero Bureau facility to property adjacent to their current facility. "This will hopefully provide some much needed relief to what is otherwise a very overcrowded facility and flight ramp, " he explained.

Di Giovanna relates that the future also holds changes in the aircraft based on their replacement program. "Our hope is to take delivery of the first of 15 AS350 B2's by late 2002 - which will eventually replace all of the MD products we currently fly." Di Giovanna noted that for the first time, they are evaluating the merits of acquiring the new aircraft with an "operational lease" instead of a straight purchase. "We have the full support of Sheriff Baca, who has really been our champion, and we will, of course, be seeking concurrence and approval soon from the Los Angeles Board of Supervisors."
